- The US will miss targets for tailpipe emissions reduction, according to a study in the journal <u>Nature</u>, unless domestic mineral production increases.

### LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT AND CEO

September 18, 2024

Dear Friend,

As Congress digs in after the summer recess, minerals mining is top of mind. The need to accelerate domestic minerals production is especially urgent as China announced its recent decision to restrict antimony exports, highlighting the danger of relying on imports. In our current state of import dependence, global adversaries hold a virtual on-and-off switch to our entire economy. Strong domestic supply chains for minerals would return our economy and energy future to our own control.

Illustrating this dynamic is a new report in **Nature**, which finds that among the U.S. and its allies, current production of minerals like cobalt, graphite, lithium and nickel, is insufficient to put 10.2 million new EVs on the road by 2032. The study, aimed at understanding how the minerals supply chain will impact whether the U.S. can meet new tailpipe emissions reduction goals, concludes that the gap between current production and the mineral supplies needed to produce those vehicles could be closed by permitting reforms.
